| | Organise your Overseas Student Health Cover which is a condition of the temporary student visa |
| | Make sure your passport is valid for the entire duration of your studies in Australia |
| | Accommodation – to avoid any stress, try organising at least a few weeks of accommodation (in a hostel or Air BnB) in Australia if you're not already booked into student accommodation or homestay |
| | Organise your finances — while you might be able to use your existing overseas account, having one in Australia will make things easier. You can open a bank account up to three months before arriving in Australia. If you choose to do it on arrival, it's a good idea to do it within the first six weeks as you usually only need to provide a passport for identification |
| | Start budgeting – make a list of expenses (accommodation, food, entertainment etc.) to figure out how much money you will have to live on each week |
| | Research phone options and make sure to unlock your phone so you can purchase a SIM card on arrival |
| | Research your new city's public transport system so that you know how to buy tickets when you arrive |
| | Book flights |
| | Start practising your English |



Moving to a new country is one of the most rewarding but challenging experiences a person can go through. The first couple of weeks will test your patience, confidence and resilience, but knowing what to expect and making sure you're organised will help you settle in quickly.







- Use public transport such as bus, train or tram. This will be much cheaper than a taxi. You will need to buy tickets or cards that are used in the transport network in your city.
- Organise for an airport bus shuttle (check your city's airport website for more information).
- Be picked up by a family member or friend.
- Catch a taxi, which is a more expensive but convenient option if you have heavy baggage.
- Look into ride sharing apps like Uber or Ola which can be cheaper than taking a taxi. Pre-download the app on your phone.
- Once you arrive, it's time to make yourself at home. If you're
 moving straight into your permanent accommodation, check that
 everything matches what you agreed to and, if you're living in private
 accommodation, make a condition report to show your landlord (within
 the first few days of moving in).
- Update your permanent address with the student services team at your university or college campus.

2. EXPLORE YOUR AREA AND BUY SUPPLIES

Now that you're officially moved in, it's time to get out and explore your new surroundings.

Here is a list of tasks to help you settle in:

- Stock up on groceries and toiletries at the supermarket locate your closest Woolworths, Coles, Aldi or IGA which are the major grocery chains across capital cities in Australia.
- Try out local cafes locating a favourite cafe can help create a sense of familiarity in your first week while everything might be feeling a little strange.
- Learn your way around take note of the locations of any services you might need including public transport stations, shops, churches, gyms and post offices.
- Furnish your new place if you're in an unfurnished room you may need to buy some staple furniture items. You can find affordable furniture and other household homewares and electronics at shops such as Kmart, Target, Big W or IKEA.
- Plan your route to campus to avoid any stress on your first day of orientation, find the quickest route to campus via Google Maps or the trip planner app relevant to your city.



3. SET UP YOUR MOBILE PHONE AND INTERNET

It's best to purchase a SIM card or Australian mobile number when you arrive in Australia.

You can choose from:

PREPAID

A prepaid service gives you flexibility because you control how much you spend and can stop using the service at any time. Pre-paid SIM cards are sold in many shops and supermarkets, as well as by mobile phone providers. Telstra, Optus and Vodafone are providers with the most coverage across Australia. After an easy set-up process with the provider, you can simply top up credit as you need it either online or at a range of retail outlets.

CONTRACT


If you will be using your mobile a lot and planning to be in Australia for a longer period, a contract might be a cheaper option. You can choose from a range of phone plans where you pay a fixed price per month for a certain amount of calls, text messages and data. Find out what documentation you will be required to provide to set up your service.

INTERNET

Many internet providers in Australia are also mobile or fixed phone carriers, and they offer pre-paid or contract internet plans. If you choose a contract service, you will receive a modem, and pay each month for a certain data allowance. To get the best deal, you can **compare providers.**

If you live in a rental property, you may need to set up an internet connection by yourself. If you have housemates, you can share the cost of the internet bills. If you live in student accommodation, check with your provider to see if internet is included in your rent.





The main Australian banks - Westpac, ANZ, Commonwealth Bank and NAB - all offer account options that are tailored specifically to international students. There are a variety of other providers so make sure you shop around for the best option.

Check out a student bank account list to help you with your decision.

Setting up an account is a straightforward process and can be started online or in person at a bank branch.

- Proof of Australian address

DEALING WITH CULTURE SHOCK

Culture shock means more than that initial feeling of strangeness you get when you land in a different country for a short holiday. It's a set of powerful emotional and

physical effects that result from moving to another country, longer term.

Some of the common symptoms include withdrawal (staying in your room, avoiding contact with others), sleeping a lot, tiring easily, feeling overwhelmed, loneliness, and frustration with the local way of doing things.

Here are some tips to help you navigate through culture shock:

- When you first arrive, go out and explore the city, make as many friends as you can and have lots of fun.
- Learn your new language as quickly as possible, which will also help in adjusting to cultural differences.
- Keep communicating and getting to know locals as much as possible, even if you feel like withdrawing.
- Put your energy into developing friendships that are supportive.
- Pursue interests and hobbies that you enjoy and that can expand your social circle.
- Connect with friends and family back home for support when you need it.
- Use the support services offered by your education provider.

ACCOMMODATION

There are a variety of accommodation options available across all major Australian cities.

MANAGED STUDENT ACCOMMODATION

Want to live in accommodation where you'll be able to socialise with other students? There are purposebuilt accommodations where the entire block is dedicated to the housing of 100-400 students. There are single or twin rooms with a shared bathroom and kitchen.

The price includes all utilities, a furnished bedroom, 24-hour security and on-site staff support, social events and activities, communal laundry facilities as well as recreation areas like cinema rooms, gyms, table tennis, gaming, television, BBQs, etc.

UniLodge and Scape are two large providers of managed student accommodation in Australia.

STUDENT HOSTELS

Student hostels offer you an affordable housing option where you'll be responsible for preparing your meals and sharing the cost of utilities such as gas, water and electricity.

Most hostels include a furnished bedroom (either private or shared) with access to communal facilities such as bathroom, laundry, kitchen and lounges.

PRIVATE RENTALS


If you'd like to be more independent, you can rent a property either on your own or rent a room in a private property. Living here, you'll be responsible for all utility costs (or sharing them) and preparing all your meals.

Though you can find fully or partially furnished private rentals, usually you are responsible for providing your furniture.

WORKING

FIND A JOB

Australia offers strong employment opportunities, and the hospitality, finance, and construction industries, in particular, are always hiring. As an international student, you are eligible to work up to 48 hours a week on your student visa.

Websites such as **Seek**, **Indeed**, **Gumtree** and **CareerOne** are very useful for job hunting, or you can enlist the help of a recruitment agency in your city. Your education provider's career service is also a great place to search out opportunities.

It's important you're aware of your rights and responsibilities to work in Australia. You have rights around minimum pay, leave entitlements, and workplace health and safety.

GET A TAX FILE NUMBER (TFN)

To be registered to pay tax in Australia, you'll need a **Tax File Number (TFN).** Your employer can provide you with the paperwork for this once you commence employment. If you haven't started your job yet, you can apply for a TFN online at the **Australian Tax Office (ATO)** website.

To apply, you'll need your passport and a valid visa.



SUPPORT SERVICES

Moving to a new country is exciting but it also means losing your close support system and having to adapt to a new education system, home, and culture.

It's important to be aware and make use of support services offered by your education provider.

A **Student Experience Officer (SEO)** is your first point of contact to help you settle into campus life.

1. ATTEND ORIENTATION ACTIVITIES

It's important to attend orientation at your education provider. It will help you prepare for your studies and provide you opportunities to meet other new students.



You can get involved in orientation activities for new international students in your city. For example, in Adelaide, you can check out the **Welcome Dinner Project**, where you can meet locals over a delicious meal.



2. BE PROACTIVE IN ORGANISING GROUP PLANS

Taking the initiative to organise fun activities is a great way to bring people together. If you're having dinner at your apartment on a Friday night, you can invite people that you meet in class to come over. Or, if you're going to the beach or having a picnic, you can arrange a get-together and introduce your new friends to each other.



3. JOIN A CLUB, SOCIETY OR SPORTS TEAM

Every education provider has a range of different clubs, societies and sports teams that you can join.

For example, **Responsible Runners** is a not-for-profit organisation which runs weekly 30-minute beach and waterway cleanups in various locations around Australia.

HEALTH AND SAFETY

SONDER

Sonder is a multilingual safety and wellbeing service app that KBS offers to all students. The Sonder team consists of a network of professionals including registered nurses, emergency response specialists, mental health first aiders and psychologists.

The app connects you with the Sonder Support Team for any issues such as safety, health issues, medical needs, mental health issues, worries or concerns. You can access the service 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

EMERGENCY SERVICES

It's important to know what to do if you experience or see an emergency. In Australia, you can call 000 for free and be connected to police, fire, and ambulance services. If you're not sure which one you need, just tell the operator the situation and they will help guide you. If you don't feel confident explaining in English, tell the operator your language and you will be connected to a translator who can help.

STAY SAFE OUTDOORS

Australia offers so many beautiful natural landscapes to explore, but to ensure you have an enjoyable time, it's important to follow a few critical safety rules:

- Only swim at beaches patrolled by surf lifeguards, and in patrolled areas marked by red and yellow flags. If you need help, stay calm and wave your arm to attract attention.
- Before entering rivers, lakes or the ocean, take note
 of any warning signs and watch out for obstacles,
 strong currents and dangerous animals such as
 jellyfish, sharks or crocodiles.
- Before going hiking or bushwalking, let someone know where you are going and when you plan to return and take the correct equipment. Research the area you are travelling to and check for dangerous conditions such as potential fires or slippery tracks.
